

45 Questions to Ask Your Guidance Counselor

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So, you've begun thinking about college applications. The process can be intimidating, but there is no shortage of resources on the Internet or even at your own school in the form of your high school guidance counselor. Your college <u>counselor</u> should be the go-to person who helps you understand the basics of the process, organize school visits, help make your school list, and assist with any issues that might come up. Your counselor will also be writing a recommendation letter on your behalf, so it's very important that you get to know this person and vice versa.

The question on your mind may be: where do you start? Once you've introduced yourself, it's time to sit down and pick his/her brain as you gear up to decide what classes to take, where to apply, what the different application components entail, and how to succeed in the process.
